Research Summit Overview

BCPH's inaugural **2024 Research Summit, "Public Health in an Election Ye ar & Beyond,"** set for Saturday, September 28, 2024, from 1:00 PM-4:00 PM EST, will focus on the impacts of the U.S. Presidential Election and politics overal I on public health through the lenses of social justice and equity. Expert panelists will address the relationship of political agendas and health issues, including:

- Sexual and reproductive health
- Individual rights for historically underserved populations, including immigrants, racial and ethnic groups, women, and LGBTQ+ persons
- Rising medication costs
- Medicaid lifetime caps
- Mental health
- Substance use treatment
- Vaccine accessibility.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the series, participants will be able to:

- Explain the potential impacts of political agendas on public health policies through the lens of social justice and equity.
- Evaluate the effects of U.S. Presidential Elections and broader political influences on individual rights and health access for historically underserved populations, including immigrants, racial and ethnic minorities, women, and LGBTQ+ persons, and the implications for public health equity.
- Discuss strategies to ensure ongoing development and implementation of evidence-based public health policies and interventions.

Beyond the Ballot: How the 2024 Election Could Impact Efforts to End the HIV Epidemic (EHE) Plan

This session will explore the anticipated impact of the 2024 U.S. election on the future of key HIV initiatives, notably the "Ending the HIV Epidemic" (EHE) plan. Participants will hear how political priorities have shaped the funding, support, impact of the EHE on the HIV arena, and what the future may hold.

Learning Objectives

Participants will emerge from the session being able to:

- Assess how the outcomes of the 2024 election could influence future federal funding, legislative support, and policy decisions related to the Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) initiative and other HIV priorities
- Discuss the impact of partisan politics on HIV prevention, diagnosis, and treatment efforts, and the advancement of EHE goals of reducing new HIV infections by 75% by 2025 and by 90% by 2030.
- Identify strategies to advocate for the continued support and sustainability of the EHE and other HIV initativies, taking into account the potential shifts in political priorities following the 2024 election, and explore how advocacy can bridge partisan divides to address broader public health challenges beyond HIV.






